## New Items

(New Items are announcements or notes of interest not appearing in other parts of the Newsletter that will usually appear one time.)

### Friday Night Bonanza

Special free plays are now awarded for playing Friday nights. If you play (and pay) for 3 Friday nights in any one month, you get a free play to be used on any Friday night within 45 days. Ginnie gave out several free plays this past Friday night for our first month of bonanza. Such a deal!

### North American Pairs

North American Pairs (NAP) is a special game held at the Spring National. Next Spring, 2010, it will be in Reno. In order to play at the National level, you must qualify at the Unit and then District levels. This process is similar to GNT (Grand National Teams) which are held at the Summer National. We will be having Club NAP qualifiers in August – look for upcoming dates. Whether you plan to go to Reno for the National or not, you can play in these games and get sectionally rated 50/50 red/black points.

### Your Board is Wrestling

Your Board meets regularly to wrestle with the mundane problems of keeping the club running smoothly - it's an all volunteer organization, so we all need to make sure we cooperate with them, and the many wonderful people who help them, those who are visible and those behind the scenes.

One item of current wrestling is WATER... We have experts who tell us that drinking water is essential, so, we've got a vending machine which dispenses bottles of water (for a price) and, we've got a refrigerator with a water line, and there's even an ice machine which allows a cup to be placed underneath so ice can flow from the freezer into the cup.

But, here's the problem. Sometimes a person has his/her cup underneath the ice, thinks that's enough ice and removes the cup, BUT...the ice is still flowing, so, it just keeps coming and goes on the floor. Now the floor has one or more ice cubes and is wet. Do all people who face this situation go take a paper towel and remove the ice pieces and dry the floor? Sadly, the answer is no.

Because the floor right there often has pieces of ice, and often is wet, THIS IS DANGEROUS and, the Board cannot allow this to continue.

So, the Board is wrestling with solutions but, in the meantime, the Board has directed that the ice machine be turned off. Sorry, even though ice is a wonderful thing to have in a cup of water, the club can't afford the danger this luxury of ice in the water brings. So, DO NOT GO INTO THE FREEZER COMPARTMENT OF THE UNIT as there is no ice in there either. There is no ice!

We're told, and we've verified that the water that flows is cold...all by itself. Thanks for understanding. Please be assured that before the Board takes actions, there has been discussion, hours and hours of discussion, plus hundreds of emails and a sincere attempt to reach a conclusion that achieves a desired result. But when it comes to safety, the Board does not have the luxury of a 50/50 finesse. We play it IMP style and take the SAFETY PLAY.

Our club has purchased a machine that will deal out cards for us. What has this world come to when we can't even deal our own cards?

Yes, this is progress. We can now have Hand Records for any and all games to help improve our game. It will also speed up the start of games.

### **Card Snapping**

Card snapping is annoying, rude, loud and most of all bad bridge etiquette. Instead of bending the card corner and snapping it on the table, try picking up the card and gently placing it on the table. If you are not aware that you are snapping the cards, please take the 'news' with good manners. Everyone at your table and in the room thank you in advance for being courteous and considerate. *(This is being reprinted in the hope that this annoying habit will go away...)*

Remember, too, the Director can penalize you for this "breach of etiquette" after one warning.

### **So You Want to Play North**

Playing North has its responsibilities; one of them is to score. Many Norths have been getting lazy and not putting all the information on travelers and pick-up slips. To refresh your memories please be sure to use the format shown in these examples: 3NE+3, 4HN-1, 5DWx-1. Everyone looks at the score and wants to see how a contract was made and who played it. It also helps to see if the score is correct. Additionally, except for Swiss scoring, please use pencil as many errors do occur (even by you!).

### **Director!**

Nothing sounds more ominous or terrifying to me than the call for the Director at a bridge club. I can even take down three, doubled, vulnerable for minus 800 far easier than the call for a Director.

So, I consulted my shrink. Permit me to share some of his words of wisdom. (First, let me ALERT you that my shrink is not a bridge player. I know some of you will now disregard everything he says. After all, how good a shrink can he be if he doesn't participate in this wondrous game we cherish - but, for better or worse, I pay his bills, so even if you won't take his advice, I will.) Actually, he quoted President Roosevelt (FDR), when, some 68 years ago (wow) our President said, "We have nothing to fear but fear itself." My shrink figures if that could work for an entire nation, it could certainly work for one person, me....

"What's the worst the Director will do?" he asked. Well, if I led out of turn...that's not good, but I'll still be allowed to play the rest of the game, and it might hurt our partnership on this one board...but it's not the entire game. If I've bid out of turn...also not good...but only this one board. Revoked? A different penalty but still only this one board...

Those are not my problems because they're all cut and dried, but what panics me is the Director call, when I sometimes don't even know why the Director is being called. Opponents now claim my partner made a bid out of tempo or someone places a Stop card on the table and my partner

didn't take the required 10 seconds to bid (is there anyone who carries a stopwatch?). It's not that my partner passes in less than 10 seconds, no, my partner needs more than 10 seconds to digest this bid and then decides to pass. Does anybody really know how long it took? Is 10 seconds both the least and the most that he has to make his bidding decision?

Why am I writing all this? Well, it turns out that in some conversations I've had with others, I'm not the only one who gets this feeling of discomfiture when a Director is called - so, at least all of us will know we're not in this alone. And, who knows, maybe it's time for us to unite and form an organization, "Players Helping Ourselves Navigate In Embroiled Situations," and we can even wear T-Shirts with the acronym of our organization printed for all to see, "PHONIES."

I feel so much better now. Hope you do too...

#### **Points of Fact:**

Claim or not Claim? Claiming IS part of the game and you should get in the habit of claiming. Having said that, you should be VERY CAREFUL when you claim.

How to claim? You expose your cards and MUST

#### **State Your Line of Play**

The exposed cards should be accompanied at once by a clear statement as to the order in which cards will be played. A simple statement saying, “I claim and will play my cards as follows: (saying how you play as you put down each card).

Once a claim is made, all play stops and claimer cannot pick up his/her hand.

Both Declarer and Opponents can claim.

If you agree with a claim, it is called acquiesce (from Latin, to agree). Fold up cards and move on.

If you don't agree, even if partner does, DO NOT EXPOSE YOUR HAND. Call the Director. If a trump is out and you did not say that you would be pulling trump in your statement of play, if there is a way you can lose a trick, you generally lose it. There are a couple of exceptions – call the Director for any claim NOT accepted.

If you as claimer give up a trick that you can't lose, you can't lose it; if you as claimer say you win a trick that you can't win, you can't win it - even though you said you can.

. . .

The Cards – ACBL Laws clearly state that:

Each pack of cards should be thoroughly shuffled before play – a cut may be requested.

The cards must be dealt face down, one card at a time, into four hands, preferably in clockwise rotation.

Each player shall count his/her cards before play.

Each player does shuffle and restore his/her original 13 cards to the board after play.

Each player must look at his/her cards before making a call.

No player should touch any cards other than his own during or after play except by permission of the Director.

Opening lead - Q♦

West led the queen of diamonds against South's game in hearts. Declarer won with the ace and played a trump to the ace, the king falling from East. How do you play the contract from this point?

Suppose you cross to your hand by cashing the ace of clubs and ruff a club. When you lay a second diamond, West will discard a club and dummy's king will win. If you play a third round of diamonds now you will go down. East will win with the jack and lead a fourth round for this partner to ruff with the nine. A spade to East's ace will allow a fifth round of diamonds (or a club) to be led. This will promote West's jack of trumps into the setting trick.

Since neither defender can play a trump (West, of course, could play a trump but should not), there is nothing to be lost by playing a spade at trick 3 instead. This cuts the link between the defenders. It also opens a safer ruffing route back to your hand than that offered by the club suit. When you regain the lead, you follow the same line as before – leading toward the diamond king, then playing to ruff the fourth round of diamonds. This time the defenders will have no way to prevent 10 tricks.
